North Avenue Streetscape Visioning Update Community review meeting Thursday, Sept. 4 7-9 p.m.

After receiving input from neighbors around the western corridor of North Avenue, the North Avenue

streetscape visioning project is well underway. Professional volunteers affiliated with the Neighborhood Design Center are translating that input into visual renderings of the streetscape. While incorporating beautification ideas they are also examining traffic patterns and walkways to try to better accommodate bicyclists and improve lighting for pedestrians.

Their preliminary work will be presented for community reaction at the Community Review Meeting at the John Eager Howard Recreation Center in Reservoir Hill on Thursday, September 4, 7 to 9 p.m. Eventually, the drawings will be used by the Baltimore City Department of Transportation when it is time to refresh the North Avenue streetscape.

Neighborhood Interest

Trees can suffer in the summer; help them. Three reasons why street trees die young: not enough water, not enough root space, the trunk flare is covered up. Summer heat can kill young trees. The 25 new trees on North Avenue's median are doing well (Mt Royal Elementary/Middle School students were among the neighbors who helped plant them), thanks to MRIA generosity and the Midtown water truck--and amazing Mother Nature this year. How much water does a tree need? If your street tree was planted this year or last, it needs 10 gallons of water twice a week May through October. Do take pity, too, on thirsty older trees, whose shade is so valuable.

Are your tree pits at least 4x8 ft? If not, consider enlarging them. Yes, it takes effort, but your tree will thank you for it by living longer and healthier.

Weeds ugh: please pull them up. Do not use horrible weed-killing compounds because they get into the tree's roots.

Light mulching is ok, heavy mulching not. Do not put mulch against the tree trunk!

Where possible, dig out that root flare after a rain. If you cannot see the trunk flaring out at the trunk base above the soil, then bugs and viruses are happily living under the damp bark and chewing away at the base of the tree. And that's why trees break off at the ground and topple over in storms.



Bees thriving in Bolton Hill. You'd never know there are 40,000 ladies in Sarah Lord's backyard. They quietly come and go all day long; in the air they "waggle dance" directions for their hive sisters: where the pollen is and what kind and where water is. Individually they live only a few weeks but what an industrious, inspiring community they are! They don't like the color brown, but they have learned that Sarah is not a bear, so it is rare that she dons her white bee suit.

Sadly, farm chemicals are wiping out bee colonies, and suburban weedkilling lawns are a death trap. Bolton Hill, it turns out, is a great place for honey bees because we don't much use as many pesticides (I've stopped altogether) and the city's too broke to mow dandelions and clover all that often.

So the ladies buzz about their business, flower to flower, and unlike wasps and yellow jackets they have zero interest in stinging unless you pose a direct threat to the hive. Tim

Finding growers who specialize in neonicotinoid-free native flowers is the only polite thing to do if you love your bees. Sarah's neighbors love them too.

(Editor's note: I am a neighbor and I do love those bees, since I know many hives have collapsed. I'm always pleased to see them on the flowers in my garden.)

Bolton Hill animal-lovers take care of unowned cats. Luz and Noelle Damron are looking after a cat colony in our area, making sure the homeless cats are fed, watered, sheltered when necessary, and most important, neutered and spayed. Luz and Carmen Pentella feed the cats, in two spots safe for the animals, in a collection of 10 bowls. which Luz takes home once a week to wash and sterilize. The Damrons also pick up glass and trash in the alley where the cats stay and put down clean bedding material. Luz says their activities with the cat colony conform to city and animal welfare ordinances--for the safety of the cats and the people who live around them. Most of the cats were abandoned when neighbors moved away.

They feed and water about nine "regulars" and some "drop-ins" of different ages, colors, and gender. The Damrons would love to have help to keep the cats safe and fed, so they are not detrimental to the neighborhood. Contact Luz Damron for more information.
