Tictory for Neighborhood at Zoning Board Bolton Hill residents recently scored a significant victory against the Hiram Grand Lodge (1207 Eutaw Place) at the city zoning board. Residents have vigorously complained for several years about late night parties, excessive noise, trash and loitering at the lodge. The lodge repeatedly promised to limit the scope of events and work to address community complaints and had repeatedly failed to do so. Numerous community organizations and residents, the police department, Councilman William Cole, and City Council President Jack Young opposed the lodge's attempt to gain zoning board approval for its late night events. The zoning board sided with the community in rejecting the lodge's efforts. The board found that the lodge's current use "should be discontinued" and severely restricted activities at the lodge. Specifically, lodge events must end by 10 p.m. and amplified music by 9 p.m. The lodge must provide soundproofing to keep noise levels low and end the practice of selling tickets or charging entrance fees. The lodge will remain open and can host events subject to these conditions.

Remove Graffiti When you see graffiti in the neighborhood, please take the time to report it to the city. No one will remove any graffiti automatically; a specific request must be entered. It is important to do this to keep our neighborhood clean and safe. Overlooked graffiti breeds more graffiti which can lead to other unwanted elements. To report an incident, go to **baltimorecity.gov**; select "Online Service request"; and "Graffiti Removal" as the Service Type; then enter the information requested through the next screens and submit. If you prefer not to fill out all your personal information, putting an email address works. This mechanism can also be used to report street lights out or trash problems along with many other concerns. For people with an iPhone or Android device there is a "311 App". You can photograph the graffiti (or overflowing trash can, dirty alley, etc) and submit it to the city directly from your phone. It uses your GPS to automatically include the location. Let's all do our part.



Vestments An Exhibition Celebrating the Life and Work of Amalie Rothschild, 11-25 April, Brown Center's Rosenberg Gallery, MICA, 1301 Mt. Royal Avenue

Showcasing one of Baltimore's most celebrated artists - and a former MICA trustee and alumna – this exhibition features a body of sculptural work based on the form of the liturgical vestment with each piece created out of a unique

mixture of materials. The exhibition coincides with the publication of Amalie Rothschild, a 500-page book edited by Angelo Pontecorboli and Amalie R. Rothschild, the daughter of the late artist. With over seventy historic districts across the city, thousands of Baltimore home-owners are eligible for a 20% tax credit on rehab projects from roof repair, wood window restoration, or even a replacement furnace.
